## Principal's Message

It's that time again! It's the official countdown to statewide student testing. Students have exactly five weeks until testing (not counting spring break). The Georgia Milestones will be administered to students in grades 3, 4 and 5, on April 13 – 26, 2016. Students in the lower grades will take district assessments on those dates. Please make sure students are present each day of testing. We will begin daily at 8:15 AM. This year the test will determine if a student gets promoted. If students do not pass reading in grade 3 or reading and math in grade 5, they may be at risk for not being promoted to the next grade. The students have taken practice tests and will receive tutorial during school hours. The students who scored in the bottom 25% on last year's test will receive additional tutorial assistance through the FLP services offered to students during some of their enrichment time.

Parents it is time for you to vote for our Local School Governance Team (GO Team) members. The Go Team is a small group of parents, teachers and community members that will meet regularly to discuss updates on instructional information. They will relay the information to the parents of Humphries. Parents who signed up to work closely on school instruction topics will appear on the GO Team ballot for Humphries. Every Humphries' parent will have his or her own personal login code to vote. This will be sent home on March 3, 2016. The code and instructions will be included on your voting code sheet. Although there are only three names on the ballot, we must follow the procedure and vote for all three. Voting will occur through an online ballot on March 8-14. Any parent without computer access may come to the parent center to use a computer between the hours of 9:00 – 1:00. Thank you for using your parent power and voting for the GO Team members.

In closing parents, I need your help. Each day several parents call the school after 2:00 to change their child's dismissal route. If your child needs to go home a different route, please write a note to the teacher and send it by your student in the morning. When parents call the school, there is often a chance the message will not get relayed to the teacher. The teacher may be out of the room when the office tries to contact them. It is very chaotic for the school when the mode of trans-

## **Kindergarten News**

We are excited about our SIGHT WORD BEE. The event will be this Friday, March 4, 2016 at 9:00 a.m. The Bee will include the red, yellow, and blue words. Students will be expected to recognize words and read the words in a sentence. Studies show that 75% of what we read on a daily basis includes sight words.

In Math, we are on addition and subtraction with objects, fingers, mental images, drawings, sounds (e.g., claps), and acting out situations, verbal explanations, expressions, or equations.

Science has focused on day and night. Students should recognize things in the day and night sky and how it works in our world. We will soon focus on things that are on the earth such as rocks and soils.

Social Studies has helped our students recognize key presidents and what the president's job is. Help your child to recognize the presidents on money, coins and bills.

Please also make sure your child is getting adequate sleep which is 9-10 hours and a good breakfast to get them going so they can begin the day at 7:45.

## **First Grade News**

The fabulous first grade team is excited about teaching and learning here at Humphries Elementary School! Parents, you have done an excellent job with getting your child to school every day so that he/she can take advantage of learning at the highest level possible. We are thankful for your continued support as we have watched our students show academic growth in the areas of reading foundations and mathematics.

School is not over; therefore, please continue to monitor daily homework and skills in each core subject area. We are focusing on the following areas: Reading - Phonemic Awareness, Phonics, Vocabulary Usage, Comprehension of Literary (Fiction) and Informational texts. ELA - Students will be able to develop a written piece composed of one to two paragraphs. In math , students will be able to understand that two digits in a 2-digit number represent tens and ones. In science - Observe, measure, and communicate weather. In social studies - Goods and Services, Scarcity, Harriet Tubman, Thomas Jefferson

Math will now be focusing on shapes and fractions and science will be focusing on motion. Students will also be adding text features and text structure to their weekly learning goals in reading. The Third Grade Team would like to remind you of how critical third grade is in your child's elementary career. Third grade is the crucial year when students make the leap from learning to read to reading to learn. It's a year filled with new academic hurdles. It's an academic hurdle that, if missed, students will struggle as their more fluent peers gain new knowledge at what seems like lightning speed. Once this type of learning lag exists, it is difficult for the kids to catch up. With this being said, it is important for YOU to emphasis that learning is the primary goal of attending school! We are noticing that many third graders are losing focus and are not actively engaged in the learning process. Learning is active and requires effort. The best antidote to reduce stressors is encouragement and preparation. Your child should be studying across all content areas 1 ½ to 2 hours nightly. Completing all homework assignments and completing the practice guide on the Georgia Department of Education website can also boost confidence. We are in the planning stages and will send out information shortly after Spring Break.

### **Enrichment News**

The Enrichment Team has been busy preparing Humphries Roadrunners for the Student Learning Objective (SLO) in the following areas: Art, Music, Spanish, and Physical Education.
