First Grade News

As we enter our second quarter of school, your first grader will continue to build their <u>reading comprehension</u> <u>strategies skills</u> which include recognizing the main idea, key details, retelling and sequencing in a text. Please continue to help your child practice reading sight words with speed and accuracy. Recognizing sight words will help your child become a more fluent reader. When reading with your child at home, remember to use these strategies.

In addition to daily reading with your child, <u>you</u> <u>may practice oral sentence dictation as well.</u> This is an important exercise to help your child repeat your sentence and then write it. Also, have them repeat aloud that a sentence begins with a capital letter and ends with an ending punctuation mark before they write.

FUNdations

Here are the skills and concepts that will be covered in our phonics program.

- letter-keyword-sound for consonants and short vowels letter formation
- alphabetical order
- sound recognition for consonants and short vowels

Grade Two News

Second grade is diligently working on mastering our reading and math skills mentioned in the prior newsletter (identifying key details, answering and asking questions; understanding place value of a three digit number). We have also introduced new reading skills to the scholars which includes identifying the moral of a fable, and describing the introduction, middle, and conclusion of a story. In Mathematics, we have introduced how to solve word problems using the CUBES strategy and adding and subtracting two digit numbers using base ten blocks. In Social Studies, we are discussing Georgia's First People (the Creek and Cherokee Native Americans) and in Science we are discussing seasonal changes!

Parents, please continue to monitor weekly homework and sign their behavior sheets!

The MOID K-2 Unit is excited to announce that the final shipment of our Literacy Center "Safe Play" Plastic Balls is on the way. That's right! Our beloved Literacy Center is about to be up and running. We will soon have a state of the art Literacy Center in which the students will have a calming, colorful, and relaxing reading area to soothe and assuage their natural love of books. Additionally, your students are incredible learners. I was so amazed as I watched them enhance their ability to count using tally marks. We used pretzels to make tallies in the classroom and one child came really close to going to 50. I was so amazed. Of course, we had pretzel and juice snacks in the meantime. Finally, my little explorers have become quite adept at differentiating between land and water on a map and a globe. They can explain how to read a simple map and they navigate quite well using the classroom globe. Greetings Parents!! Happy Fall!! The year is flying by, with everything moving so fast we would like to remind you of a few important things...

- Students should be reading every night for 20 minutes.
- Students should be practicing multiplication facts for mastery. The goal is to have the students master their 2's, 3's, 4's and 6's. Please study with them and make or purchase flashcards.

In Reading ELA, we are focusing on main idea and supporting details. Have the students review these skills throughout their reading each night. In Math, we are focusing on division and multiplication!! In Science, we are working on Pollution. In Social Studies, we are working on Geography/ Government. There is a slight change to our Homework sheet, we will now complete one sheet for two days (ex: Sheet 1 due on Tuesday). We want to make sure you are using the extra time to practice reading!!! Hello Families! Well, the first nine weeks are behind us. We celebrate the outstanding of accomplishments of our students and we recognize that we still have many areas where we can grow. In math, the stu-
