ATLANTA PUBLIC SCHOOLS On February 9, 2012 the Georgia Department of Education (GaDOE) received waivers from ten requirements of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) of 1965, as amended by No Child Left Behind (NCLB) of 2001. ESEA/NCLB requires that parents or guardians who have children attending a Title I school be notified of the school's academic achievement as well as a school's designation under Georgia's ESEA Flexibility Waiver. This letter is intended to provide additional information concerning the options available to your child under Georgia's ESEA Flexibility Waiver and to help you understand what the wavier will mean for you and your child.

English Language Arts. Moreover, we will consistently strive for academic achievement through programs that motivate and assist our students meet state achievement standards.

Beginning in the 2012-2013 school year, Title I schools transitioned from a No Child Left Behind (NCLB), Needs Improvement (NI) status based on Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) to a Reward, Priority, Focus or Alert school status based on definitions provided by the US Department of Education. Schools that have been identified as a (*Reward, Priority, Focus or Alert school*) and receives Federal Title I funds, will now implement specific programs and interventions for students in meeting state achievement standards.

At **Hope-Hill Elementary School**, we are very proud of our teachers and feel they are ready for the coming school year and are prepared to give your child a high-quality education. As a Title I school, we must meet federal regulations related to teacher qualifications as defined by ESEA. These regulations allow you to learn more about your child's teachers' training and credentials. We are happy to provide this information to you. At any time, you may ask:

- Whether the teacher met state qualifications and certification requirements for the grade level and subject he/she is teaching,
- Whether the teacher received an emergency or conditional certificate through which state qualifications were waived, and
- What undergraduate or graduate degrees the teacher holds, including graduate certificates and additional degrees, and major(s) or area(s) of concentration.

You may also ask whether your child receives help from a paraprofessional. If your child receives this assistance, we can provide you with information about the paraprofessional's qualifications.

Our staff is committed to helping your child develop the academic knowledge and critical thinking he/she needs to succeed in school and beyond. That commitment includes making sure that all of our teachers and paraprofessionals are highly skilled.
