American Rescue Plan Act of 2021



American Rescue Plan (ARP) Overview

- The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 was signed into law on March 11, 2021. The law provides \$1.9 trillion in COVID-19 relief, including allocations of roughly \$125 billion for the K-12 education system.
- \$201,029,151 has been allocated to Atlanta Public Schools.
- Period of Availability: March 13, 2020- September 30, 2023, with an additional 12 months extended for any carryover.

American Rescue Plan (ARP) Overview

- ARP funds have been provided to districts to:
 - Provide for a safe return to in person instruction consistent with CDC guidance on reopening schools.
 - Address learning loss through evidence-based interventions.
 - Target students who are underserved or disproportionately impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.
 - Maintain continuity of services for students and staff including SEL, mental health, student health, and food services.

This presentation will provide an overview of the district's plan for ARP funds.

- APS plans to continue to improve the air quality of all school buildings and facilities to ensure each classroom is properly sanitized to minimize the spread of COVID and other viruses
- HVAC Filter Upgrades throughout the system
- Air purifiers to be provided in all classrooms

Business Functions

- Upgrade to timekeeping system (UKG) to support flexible work schedules, extended day schedules, summer work schedules, etc.
- Addition of 1.0 staff member in Budget Services to assist in management of ARP funds
- Additional platforms for communication and engagement

The Atlanta Virtual Academy (AVA) has expanded its programming to include synchronous instruction for every student from a highly-qualified teacher. The expansion of this program includes an increase in Full-time instructors for grades K-12:

- •The content is aligned with Georgia Standards and taught by certified APS teachers who provide instruction and are available for real-time support.
- •Students have access to an enriched curriculum which will include music, art, physical education and world language

Target Students Who Are Underserved or Disproportionately Impacted by the COVID-19 Pandemic

APS will continue to provide support to students disproportionately impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. This work includes the stipends to be paid to teachers of high needs subject areas and those at high poverty schools. Also, a Universal screener for Behavioral and Mental Health will help our district assess the needs of our students along with 8 full-time Student Support Specialists.

Target Students Who Are Underserved or Disproportionately Impacted by the COVID-19 Pandemic

- Student Health and Wellness
 - Additional Student Support Specialists: The district is funding 8 positions to be combined with the 1 pending District Student Support Specialist position to serve as boots on the ground in support of each cluster and the successful rollout and implementation of the Academic Recovery Block, Universal Academic Screener, Universal Mental Health/Behavior Screener, Multi-Tiered Systems of Support, and Early Intervention Program / Remedial Education Program. This proposed support model will provide consistency and direct expertise and support to schools which are key actions to enhance district-wide adoption, implementation, and sustainability.
 - Behavior Universal Screener The Office of Student Services (OSS) is piloting the implementation of a universal health/social-emotional/behavior screener and supplemental screening assessments. The purpose of these assessments is to identify social, emotional, and behavioral outcomes for K-12 students over time, as well as, identify students in need of wrap around and mental health supports.

Target Students Who Are Underserved or Disproportionately Impacted by the COVID-19 Pandemic

- Teacher Recruitment and Retention: Total \$6.3m
 - \$1.3m for special education teacher stipends for the 21-22 school year to recruit and retain staff in high needs subject areas
 - \$3m for stipends to recruit and retain staff in high poverty schools, as defined by direct certification, for the 21-22 school year
 - \$2m for teacher recruitment initiatives for 22-23 and 23-24 school years to attract high quality teachers to APS and reduce the impacts of teacher shortages on underserved students

APS plans to continue to address the needs of the whole child as identified and assessed beyond the classroom by providing services to address physical and mental well-being and social emotional needs.

- Employee Well-being and Mental Health Support: Total \$2.9m
 - Employee counseling program, providing real-time access to licensed counseling services across all employee types and work locations for the 22-23 and 23-24 school years
 - Also includes supervisor training related to supporting employees' mental health needs and associated materials, surveys, program evaluation, and related administrative costs

Nutrition

- Nutrition Department provides all students healthy school meals that meet their daily nutritional needs and support optimal academic performance for student success during inperson and virtual learning models. Currently, all student meals are provided through the USDA Seamless Summer Option (SSO) program, a federally funded meal program that provides well-balanced free meals to all children in the City of Atlanta ages 1 – 18.
- Nutrition plans to maintain two student meal service models: Virtual and In-Person
- Expected decrease for the USDA School Meals Program
 - Decreased meal participation due the hybrid meal delivery models (In-Person and Virtual)

- Health and Wellness
 - Expansion of School Social Workers The district is providing 41 additional social workers to ensure that all schools have a full-time social worker on staff. School social workers provide suicide support and awareness, identify gaps in the provision of MH services and secure additional community resources, partners, and programs to meet those gaps, Increase MH awareness, facilitate MH support, assessment and PL (YMHFA, Signs of Suicide, Sources of Strength, work collaboratively with Safety & Security in conducting student welfare checks, aid in the rollout of district-wide trauma informed training and the adoption of trauma informed practices.
 - Expansion of School Psychologists -- The district is providing 25 additional school psychologists to increase school allocations of staff. School psychologists provide evaluations of students, consult with teachers, families, and other mental health professionals to improve support strategies; work with school administrators to improve school-wide practices and policies; and collaborate with community providers to coordinate needed services.
 - Continued Support of Nursing Services The district is providing additional funds to strengthen the provision of nursing services throughout our schools and facilities. School nurses support and enhance educational achievement by improving and protecting the health status of students through the prevention of illness, early detection, and removal or modification of health related barriers to learning.
