#### V. Discussion Items

- a. **Discussion Item 1:** Student Data Review (presented by Gail Johnson) Data was shared by Gail Johnson via screen share.
  - 1. Universal Screener Data MAP assessment (Fall 2021-22 / August)
    - MAP scores offer the most current data for strategic planning, Math and Reading
    - Students will take the MAP test two more times this school year Winter / December and just before Milestones in the Spring. We will revisit the data following the additional tests.
    - Color coding informs proficiency:
      - Dark Green Distinguished (above grade level)
      - Light Green Proficient (at grade level)
      - Yellow Developing (right below grade level threshold)
      - Red Beginning (at beginning of grade level knowledge)
    - Number of total exams was highlighted and Sutton was noted as a unique population within our APS district middle schools, for data comparison sake
    - Sutton data is outperforming the district scores in both Math and Reading

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- Sutton Math scores are slightly less proficient than our Reading scores, which was noted as expected given the Pandemic
- Sutton Student Groups
  - Data Overview: Grade bands 6<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup>; Math / Reading (Gail Johnson to update overall number of White exams, as number of incorrect in presentation)
    - Proficiency data appears consistent across grade bands
    - No trend data is available at this time because MAP is a new assessment for APS, but scores will be used as a baseline
  - ii. Data Overview: White, Black, Hispanic, SWD (Students with Disabilities), EL (English Learners)
    - There are significant achievement gaps between the White student group and the other student groups. The MAP data is consistent with past Milestones and STAR testing.
    - o Sutton has the highest performing Black students in APS
    - Sutton has the second highest Hispanic students in APS
    - Data graphs for Student Groups were also reviewed for each grade band for both Reading and Math
    - Note for the Hispanic Student Group, half are English Learners
    - Overall Student Groups appear to increase their proficiency in Math and Reading, when comparing 6<sup>th</sup> grade data to 7<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> grade data to 8<sup>th</sup>, which implies growth while at Sutton. Since the Fall MAP data is a baseline test, this trend will need to be confirmed once further testing occurs.
    - Note that once ESOL students come out of services, they are monitored / tracked over 4 years
    - Comparison of MAP scores by ethnicity to overall district scores show our African American students performing significantly higher in both Math and Reading than other African American students in the district. Our Hispanic / Latino population is performing at generally the same level as other Hispanic / Latino students in the district. Our White students are performing slightly below the district level in Math when compared to other white students in APS and slightly above in Reading.
    - Students generally perform lower in Math in middle grades than Reading

#### 2. Behavior Summary / Discipline Data

- Behavior Incidents at Sutton
  - o 98.4% of Sutton students have no OSS days





- 1.6% (25 students) with 1 or more OSS Days
- Student suspension rate is under 1%
- Behavior incidents typically happen on the bus or during non-structured (non-instructional) time
- Students are typically compliant and engaged during Tier 1 instruction

#### 3. Intervention / Enrichment

- Line for Intervention / Enrichment was tied to individual students score related to MAP National Norm Proficiency levels per grade
- Proficiency scores will change (grow) throughout the year
- Students will take the MAP test three times this year and will move into Intervention or Enrichment based on their proficiency
- Note the MAP test is new this year, so first test data may be tied to test being a new to the students. Growth is expected after next test.

#### 4. Milestones

- Data trends cannot be determined since only approximately 130 students took the Milestones last year
- 5. APS Insights https://apsinsights.org/
  - Sutton Enrollment demographics
    - Site provides enrollment trends / data is available through 2020
    - o Enrollment dip related to pandemic
    - Enrollment is down approx. 34 students overall, low number isn't impactful
    - o 1651 (2020), 1634 (2021) student enrollment
    - Hispanic population is trending downward
    - Sutton student population is diverse we are a no majority / minority school
  - Milestones
    - o performance data on APS Insights is 3 years old, pre-pandemic
    - staffing can affect dips in performance
    - o Sutton overall scores are trending upward
- 6. Pandemic Impact Is pre-pandemic data still relevant?
  - See 2021-22 as baseline the kids are affected by the pandemic
  - New Math and Reading programs were introduced during the pandemic which are problem-solving based
  - Shelly Riddle Math



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- Coming off pandemic with new math program (Amplify)
- There appear to be gaps in foundational skills
- Teachers are having to learn new program to implement, which is the biggest obstacle
- Isreal Vance ELA / DLI & Antoine Edwards ELA
  - o New ELA program
  - Teachers need time to get used to program
  - Teachers need 2<sup>nd</sup> set of MAP scores to understand data
  - o There appear to be gaps in reading comprehension
  - Discrepancies are being seen between current and student past data – pre-pandemic v/s current
- Intervention block
  - o hurdle to get started and implement
  - o delay in material
  - o technological challenges with bandwidth
  - new program implementation is general challenge
- General
  - Gail Johnson It's important that "We see this year from own's lens in Strategic Planning"
  - 6<sup>th</sup> grade students have less skill sets, content is more rigorous in middle school
  - General challenge New programs were introduced during the pandemic. These Math and ELA programs were APS District implemented; new to Dr. Herring's administration, schools no longer select their own Math and ELA programs.

#### 7. Emotional Wellbeing

- Student emotional wellbeing ratings showed that Sutton students are in far better emotional wellbeing overall than other middle schools in district
- Risk rated, most students were in no-risk
- There are about 30-40 students at each grade level who identified as extreme risk. Counselors are working with those students and parents have been notified.
- Test will be given the test again in January 2022.
- Sutton overall culture does not appear to be traumatized
- No sub-group differences in emotional wellbeing data
