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Kindergarten News

Kindergarten has been off to a wonderful start. The children have settled quickly into classroom routines and are learning to become more independent. They show positive attitudes towards learning and they are learning to be supportive, kind, and respectful.

<u>Language Arts:</u> Kindergarten will be continuing to review their letters and letter sounds as well as practice their printing every day.

<u>Reading:</u> Students are learning the difference between a nonfiction and fiction book. We will also learn how to ask questions and identity the topic and main ideas of a nonfiction book. We are continuing to introduce a new skills and concepts.

<u>Math:</u> This month Kindergarten will be working on understanding patterns and sorting. They will also continue to work with numbers just beyond 20.

<u>Science:</u> Students with learn about Earth's materials and resources.

<u>Social Studies:</u> Students will continue to learn about the work that people do in our community and what type of service they provide to us.

First Grade News

The fantastic first grade teachers and students are off to a wonderful and productive school year. We have covered several skills in a short amount of time. Parents we need your help to assist your child with practicing their Dolch Sight word lists according the designated color for that month.

Here is a peek at some of the skills we have studied in the following content areas that are listed below:

- Reading/ELA-Story Elements, short vowels, diagraphs, and verbs
- Writing-Informational Writing, identifying and writing complete sentences
- Math-Counting and identifying numbers 1-120, place value, one more, one less, addition and word problems
- Science- Weather & Seasons
- Social Studies- Needs, wants, scarcity, jobs, geography and landforms

Grade Two News

It was great to see a lot of families at our fall Open House! Thanks for taking your time to visit our classroom and learn about what your child has been doing in class. Our students have engaged in many challenging and rewarding learning experiences and there's more to come. In the month of October, 2nd graders will continue to look at characters in literature and how they respond to major events in the plot. We will also focus on describing and making connections in informational texts. In math, the students will build on concepts learned last year in 1st grade and become more fluent in addition and subtraction. In science, we are learning about stars and in social studies we are learning about the regions and major rivers of Georgia.

Please be involved in your child's education by checking their homework, attendance and academic progress often. Make attending school meetings, events, and parent-teacher conferences a priority. Ask teachers if you can help them find educational materials and resources that they need and if you have time, help the teacher in the classroom.

MOID K-2

Autumn is officially here! Leaves are beginning to change. The leaves that were green during the spring and summer will now begin to turn yellow, orange, brown, and red! What a beautiful sight to behold! The MOID K-2 Unit will be utilizing our STEM day to discover that these colors are already inside the green leaves. Students will discover, using chromatography, that they can separate a mixture into its parts. We will use simple rubbing alcohol and coffee filters to see the different colors that are already in the green leaves. Also, we have learned how to safely experiment and complete observations. We will all wear our goggles and we are going to be really careful when pouring rubbing alcohol. As a matter of fact, we will simply observe; while our teachers pour the alcohol for us! Grade Three News

Our daily homework is used to reinforce skills we learn or will earn in class each day. It is very important to turn in homework on Thursdays, it does count as a grade! Please stress the importance of students being able to SHOW THEIR WORK and JUSTIFY THEIR ANSWERS in Math. Have them slow down and explain the steps to you as if they are teaching you how to do it. We are also continuing the Math Ninja Multiplication contest with our 3s, 4s, and 5s multiplication Facts. You're your students at home to challenge them. HOMEWORK IS GIVEN DAILY TO STUDENTS.

Enrichment News

During In SPANISH, students will continue to concentrate heavily on the use of cardinal numbers as well as being introduced to new essential vocabulary each class period. Hispanic Heritage Month began September 15 and will last until October 15. In addition to standards being taught, various individuals of Hispanic origin who have made notable contributions to society will be highlighted in class weekly.

The following are some of the exciting activities that will be happing in ART:

- 5th graders will be creating geometric sculptures.
- 4th graders will drawing a close up view of an object from nature.
- 3rd grade will be creating a landscape drawing.
- 2nd grade will be drawing a picture of themselves dancing.
- 1st grade will be creating stormy weather drawings.
- K/ Pre K will be creating shape animals.

All grades will be participating in the Cyber Security Poster Contest.

During PE, we will continue to focus on Physical Education Standards 1 & 2. Students will demonstrate competency in motor skills and movement patterns, as well as develop an understanding of movement concepts. Our unit focus will be fitness, students will have an opportunity to rotate to different exercise stations. The purpose of this fitness unit is to help improve students' cardiorespiratory endurance!

In MUSIC, the students are celebrating Hispanic Heritage Month by singing, dancing, and learning about composers and performers of Spanish decent. The students are learning patriotic songs that celebrate our country.
