Help Children Learn at Home

Keep Children Learning While School's Out Stay in touch with your child's school

• Many schools are offering lessons online (virtual learning). Review assignments from the school, and help your child establish a reasonable pace for completing

the work. You may need to assist your child with turning on devices, reading instructions, and typing answers.

• Communicate challenges to your school. If you face technology or connectivity issues, or if your child is having a hard time completing assignments, let the school know.

Create a flexible schedule and routine for learning at home

- Have consistent bedtimes and get up at the same time, Monday through Friday.
- Structure the day for learning, free time, healthy meals and snacks, and physical activity.
- Allow flexibility in the schedule—it's okay to adapt based on your day.

Consider the needs and adjustment required for your child's age group

- The transition to being at home will be different for preschoolers, K-5, middle school students, and high school students. Talk to your child about expectations and how they are adjusting to being at home versus at school.
- Consider ways your child can stay connected with their friends without spending time in person.

Look for ways to make learning fun

- Have hands-on activities, like puzzles, painting, drawing, and making things.
- Independent play can also be used in place of structured learning. Encourage children to build a fort from sheets or practice counting by stacking blocks.
- Practice handwriting and grammar by writing letters to family members. This is a great way to connect and limit face-to-face contact.
- Start a journal with your child to document this time and discuss the shared experience.
- Use audiobooks or see if your local library is hosting virtual or live-streamed reading events.

Ask about school meal services

Check with your school on plans to continue meal services during the school dismissal. Many schools are keeping school facilities open to allow families to pick up meals or are providing grab-and-go meals at a central location.

Atlanta COVID-19 Emergency Rental Assistance Program

Intake application to be considered for Emergency Rental Assistance.

The City of Atlanta COVID-19 Emergency Rental Assistance Program is available to City of Atlanta residents ONLY. Funds may be used to cover past due rent, utilities, and move-in deposits as a result of impending eviction. At the end of the application you will be required to

upload **documentation** to prove your identity, your income, the loss of income caused

by the pandemic and the amount of your need based on past due bills or a move-in deposit. Until that point in the application, you will be able to save and continue later. If you choose to save and continue, we will send a link to access your application to the email you provide. Your application will not be considered until all required fields and documents are submitted.

If you do not qualify for the Atlanta COVID-19 Emergency Assistance Program, you can fill out a short form to submit a request for other available resources.

Fulton County Georgia assistance programs.

Find how to get financial help in the Atlanta Georgia and Fulton County region. Low-income families, senior citizens, and others can find programs that help pay their rent or utility bills, provide free food, as well as medical or dental care and address other living expenses. There are dozens of churches,

charities, and even government human service agencies that focus on supporting struggling residents of the Fulton County area.

Other resources in the region include **free loans with zero interest**

rates, back to school supplies, as well as motel or gasoline vouchers. Low income families, seniors, and the disabled can also apply for services ranging from furniture bank assistance programs to free Christmas gifts or medical care too.

Locate help with bills and expenses

The **Fulton Atlanta Community Action Authority** (FACAA) assists families and individuals of Fulton County and Atlanta by offering them various resources and programs that enable them to emerge from economic despair, help pay energy bills, stop evictions, prevent homelessness, and overall improve their living conditions.

Emergency Assistance - This program offered by FACAA provides grants and funds to help people make it thru a crisis, such as a job loss, medical emergency, foreclosure or eviction proceedings or some other emergency. Some of the programs and assistance offered includes :

- Grants for energy assistance to prevent disconnection from their utility service.
- Assistance and money to help someone avoid evictions and stop a foreclosure.
- Resources and benefits to ensure shelter or housing with goal-oriented case management and counseling.
- Emergency food assistance.

Georgia Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP)

This will help low and moderate income people pay their winter heating bills as well as summer cooling bills through home heating energy assistance grants and crisis grants. It is run by the Fulton Atlanta Community Action Authority. Crisis grants help those people who are in an emergency situation. You do not need to have an unpaid bill to receive home heating or cooling energy assistance. This program is available at designated times throughout the year, such as November and during the late spring. More

Job Guidance, Employment and Counseling

The employment services offered by the Fulton Atlanta Community Action Authority has undergone a change in which a shift of services has occurred within FACAA. Now their services have been steered to a more creative approach to assisting the unemployed. The FACAA organization now provides scheduled workshops, job finding assistance, and individual counseling in the following areas:

Financial assistance for hardships

Another local agency to turn to for aid is the **North Fulton Community Charities**. This agency also offers several different programs and access to funds for short term expenses. Last year they provided almost 25,000 food items, they provided over \$1.2 million in cash grants and financial assistance for bills and housing expenses, and they provided clothing to over 2,000 families.

One of the main goals of the non-profit North Fulton Community Charities (NFCC), which is a so called human service agency, is to prevent people from being evicted, stop homelessness, and utility service disconnections. The agency is committed to preventing homelessness of individuals in Atlanta and Fulton County. The NFCC agency assists individuals and families by providing for basic needs such as food, utility bill assistance and rent, and even high quality clothing. Cooling bill assistance is also administered by the Salvation Army centers across the Atlanta region. Resources can provide people with fans, gently used air conditioners, or money to pay cooling bills. Centers are also opened around Fulton County that people can stop by at for water, ice cream, and a

Various programs are administered by the **Hosea Williams Feed the Hungry Foundation**. They offer help for the homeless in Atlanta and Fulton County, provides funds for paying rent and preventing evictions, and may even have funds to pay utility and summer cooling bills. If you live in the Atlanta zip codes of 30319 or 30341, the **St. Martin in the Fields Emergency Assistance Fund** may have financial assistance for you if you are facing a hardship. You can only receive a small amount (up to \$50) every six months. But they can help with rent, utility bills, health care and prescription drug costs, your mortgage and water bills. Short term loans are available. These will be from private lenders. The options in Atlanta range from title to payday loans, cash advances, and more. Note the funds can be used for paying bills, but these do

Action Ministries Atlanta offers assistance for veterans from the federal SSVF - Supportive Services for Veterans. Other housing programs from Action Ministries in Atlanta includes transitional housing, placement into low income apartments, information on grants for one time rent help, the HOPWA program, and funds for security deposits. The **Fulton County Georgia Division of Family and Children Services** is arguably the leading government organization to call for financial assistance, advice, and referrals. Some of the programs include, but are not limited to, job finding services and training. Medical bills and needs can be met by Medicaid and other health care programs. Other services include cash assistance,

Transitional housing services are available across Atlanta and the greater Fulton County area. A program known as **Home Sweet Home: Saving Homes, Saving Families**, is a foreclosure program that was created to help homeowners who are facing a foreclosure on their primary home or mortgage. When you sign up for this program, certified Housing Counselors will advocate on behalf of the clients with your lender to help you secure a loan modification on your mortgage. If it is later determined there is the need for legal intervention in your particular case, you will referred to the Atlanta Legal Aid, Inc.

Also, if the Housing Counselor who has been assigned to your care is unable to negotiate a loan modification with your mortgage provider, the counselor will then proceed to assist the individual/family with relocating to a new single home managed by a third-party management firm or to a new apartment. The contact information is below.

The Home Sweet Home program is extensive, and Home Sweet Home: Saving Homes, Saving Families also offers a six-part Financial Fitness/Homeownership series and education seminar that provides money management skills and other information relevant to handling the family finances. Foreclosure prevention counseling and assistance

Receive free counseling from a HUD approved specialist. The **Atlanta Urban League** provides counsel and advocacy that only a HUD Approved Counselor can provide. These specialists' are often a welcome addition to the foreclosure mediation or negotiation process for the mortgage company, and they can do a tremendous job in providing a sense of relief to the client as well as information on solutions. The Housing Counselor creates a detailed budget for the client to use, they offer foreclosure prevention and mortgage delinquency counseling. These services are offered to homeowners who are delinquent on their mortgage or facing a lose of their home due to a foreclosure. The program offers people an opportunity to get their home loan back on track.
