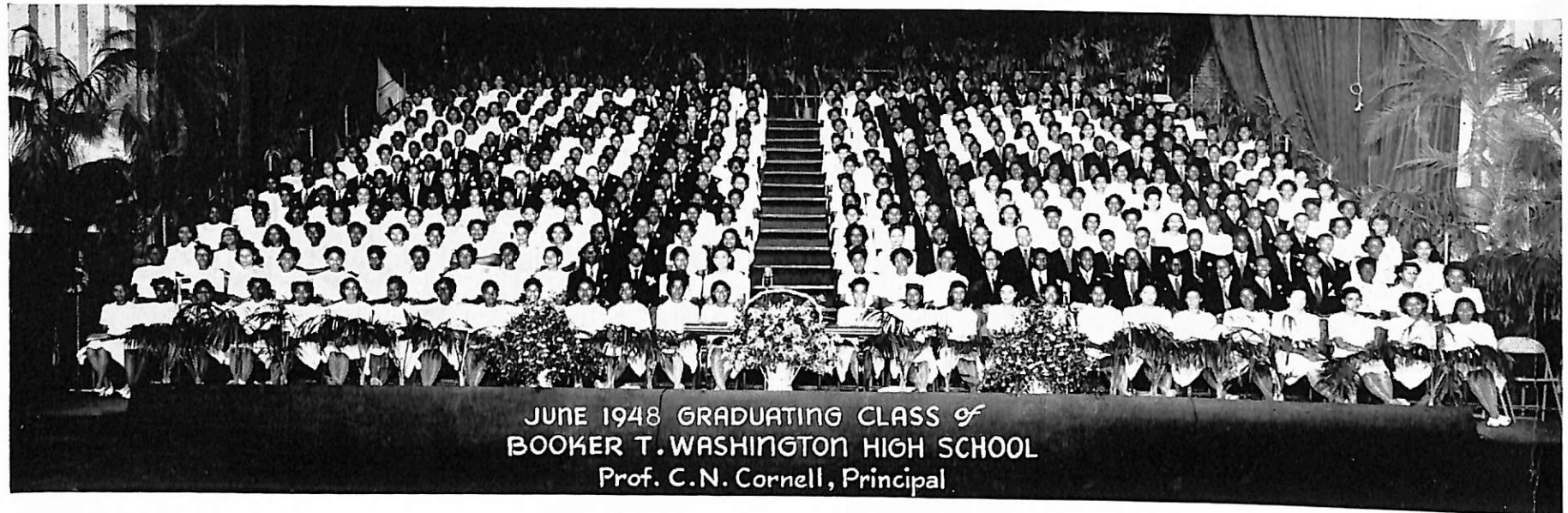

Impressions of a Foreigner



Washington High School: Jsme vycvičení v první pomoci.

Pak jsem poznal jednu z největších negerských středních škol, v níž studuje 3.700 studentů, a jež má jméno po vynikajícím kulturním pracovníkovi, černochu Booker T. Washingtonovi, jehož životním posláním bylo pozdvihnout sociální úroveň černochů kulturou. Ředitelem je velmi inteligentní černoch a v jeho sboru je 120 vesměs černých profesorů a profesorek, z nichž každý vyučuje 9—12 skupin (třídy v našem smyslu zde neexistují, žáci jen střídají pracovní). V každé skupině je nejvíce 40 studentů. Škola je na první pohled přeplněná a nejvíce je to vidět při střídání. Mají zde velkou žákovskou kapelu, asi 120člennou, řídí ji štihlý černý profesor. Jsou v ní zastoupeny všechny dechové nástroje a zvláštní americký triangl. Zahráli pro mne místy ne docela čistě, ale s velkým elánem vojenský pochod „The World is Waiting for the Sunrise“ od Lockharda Seize, a „Malou rapsodii v modrém“ od George Gershwilla. I zde je řada laboratoří, chemická, fyzikální, zeměpisná atd. a dílny, na př. krejčovská, v níž si přý studenti šijí také šaty k maturitě. Dnes šijí části mužského oděvu jako kapsy, límce a pod. Děvčata mají rovněž krejčovské dílny. Učí se tu psaní na stroji v pracovně s množstvím psacích strojů, je tu i truhlářská a natěračská dílna, též řádná tiskárna. V hodinách kreslení připravují členové Dorostu pro vojáky zvláštní kresby na servírovací stolků a v ručních pracích modelují z novinového papíru zvířátka, na př. kachny a také masky. Dělají též výrobky hliněné, které vypalují ve vlastní elektrické peci. Je tu znát, že černoši mají zvláštní výtvarné schopnosti. Že jsou velmi muzikální, dokázaly dívky krásným sborovým zpěvem v hudební síni. Někteří členové Dorostu prošli kursem první pomoci — vyfotografoval jsem je za deště před vchodem do školní budovy.

TRANSLATION OF THE EXCERPT OF AN
ARTICLE WRITTEN BY JOSEF SUCHANEK,
DIRECTOR OF THE CZECHOSLAVAK
JUNIOR RED CROSS

Note: Mr. Suchanek, visited Washington High School early in the school year and mailed a copy of the Czechoslovakian Junior Red Cross Magazine which carried his article, "With the American Secondary School Juniors."

I had the opportunity to see the largest Negro secondary school. There are 3,700 students in this school. It carries the name of an outstanding Negro cultural worker, Booker T. Washington, whose aim it was to raise the social standard of Negroes with the help of education and culture. The headmaster of this school is a very intelligent Negro and most of the 120 teachers are Negroes, too. Each of the teachers teaches five groups—there are no grades in our sense of the word. Each group has forty students at the most. The school seems to be overcrowded. This can be noticed best of all during the break when students are changing from one room to the other. They have a very large school band with about 120 musicians. They are being led by a slim Negro teacher. They play all wind-instruments and the special American instrument, the triangle. They played for me—in places it was not quite clear—but with great gusto the song, "The World is Waiting for the Sunrise," by Lockhart Seize, and the "Rhapsody in Blue," by George Gershwin. Here I also found various laboratories, scientific, chemistry, geography, etc., as well as workshops, such as a tailoring workshop where students make their own clothes for their final examinations. On that day they were making parts of a suit: pockets, collar, etc. The girls also have their dress-making workshops. They can also learn how to type; there is a large room with many typewriters. There is also a joiners and painters workshop here, and quite a number of printing shops. In art lesson J.R.C. members paint traycloths for soldiers in hospitals, and during handicraft class they model animals of papier-mache. They also make articles of clay which they burn in a special oven. Here we can see that Negroes have a special art talent. They are also very musical which can be judged by a very fine musical performance of the girls at that school. Some of the J.R.C. members attended a course of first aid. I took a snap of some of them in front of the school just while it was raining.

School History

Time To Turn Back

"TIME PRESENT AND TIME PAST ARE BOTH PERHAPS PRESENT IN TIME FUTURE."

How impressive in these times is change—rapid, pervasive, bewildering! This is true in education as in other aspects of the life of the community. Thus, in this era of great school expansion, Washington High School faces the future. But let us look back over twenty-four years of progress.

It would be impractical to tell here all the stories of human interest; to do honor to all those who gave their faithful services in guiding thousands of students who sought knowledge; to list the accomplishments of former students and graduates who have made this a better place in which to live. It would be practical here to give briefly an overview of the colorful history of Booker T. Washington High School.

While it was the intention of the Board of Education to construct a school large enough to accommodate all those wishing to attend, it was early realized the main building was inadequate. Portable buildings were

therefore added. In 1936, eight rooms were added to the main building and the student body totalled close to 4,000 with a faculty of one hundred teachers.

At present, thirty-two new rooms are being added to the building, which may mean the abolition of the portable rooms.

The first graduating class of 125 students, completed its work in 1927 and since that time, the number of graduates has increased. The largest graduating class was in 1947 when over six hundred students received diplomas.

Washington High School has promoted a rich and varied program for students and for community development. A monument of Booker T. Washington, a replica of the one on the grounds of Tuskegee Institute, was erected in 1926 through contributions made by the students and faculty. An athletic field, one of the largest and best in the South,

was developed, fenced and opened in 1939. Earlier a cafeteria was constructed, furnished and opened for the accommodation of the students. In both projects, the funds were largely raised by the students and faculty.

In 1927, a cultural program was launched and annually an artist of national distinction was brought to Atlanta. These artists include Lillian Evanti, Marian Anderson, Hazel Harrison, Etta Moton, the Southernaires and Carol Brice.

One of the outstanding features of the educational program of Washington High School was the honor trip project. For several years, funds were raised for educational tours. About thirty-five students were taken annually to several historical points of interest in the country. These tours included the Chicago World Fair in 1933. Other tours included New York, Philadelphia, Washington and historical points in Virginia, West Virginia, North Carolina and Tennessee.

The student government, developed over a period of years, has been a model for scores of other schools. The elections approximate in character regular state elections. Tremendous interest has been aroused among the citizens of the city and state.

The graduates of Washington High School have achieved distinction in many fields of endeavor, and in both Southern and Northern schools. Its faculty is highly trained, a large number of them holding master's degrees from the leading universities of the country.

Washington High School has grown from an enrollment of 1,500 students and forty teachers in September, 1924 to a community school of 3,861 students and 112 teachers in September, 1948. The community school continues to grow in facilities and in its educational outlook. Its contribution to the war efforts, the A rating by the Southern Accrediting Association, and the building expansion program are only a few of the achievements that place Washington High School in the rank of progressive school systems of the nation.

Whatever Washington High School comes to be, her historians must say with the poet at every development:

*"A moment not out of time,
but in time, in
What we call history."*

Washington High School is much like the community—a populous and active city. Long ago, the idea of extra-curricular activities which sounded like "excess baggage," was discarded for the later idea of a significant program that prepares the students for community living. In the wheel of life, there is a segment to interest the heterogeneous group of over three thousand students who crave action—who have a burning desire to create—who seek new ideas.

The Glee Club, the Girls Chorus, the Band and the Boys Choir keep busy with campus and off-campus concerts all during the year.

Students are given an opportunity to participate in annual contests sponsored by fraternities, sororities and other organizations like the American Legion and the Tuberculosis Association. Winners compete against city, state and national participants.

The oratorical contest sponsored annually by the Elks gives students an opportunity to speak in public.

Those who like journalism contribute to the "Washingtonian," the school paper.

The art club trains students to appreciate the beautiful in design, color and arrangement, and encourages creative ability. Students have won recognition in their contributions to the annual art exhibition held at Atlanta University.

Various clubs like the Y-Teen, Art Club, the Horizon, the French Club, Senior Scouting and the Youth Theatre come in for their share in helping to make the students useful citizens.

The Distributive Cooperative Training program attracts a number of students who are interested in studying while learning the various skills on the job. Employers have been well pleased with the efficiency shown by those who spend half the day on the off-campus jobs.

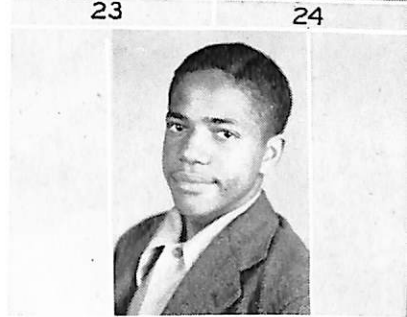

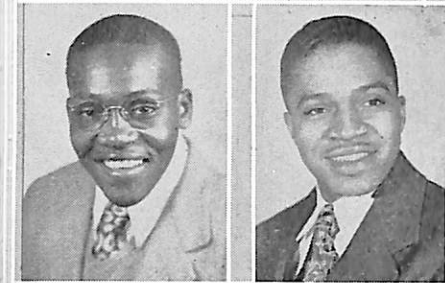

Remember physics, trigonometry, geometry and advanced algebra? These were our Waterloo.

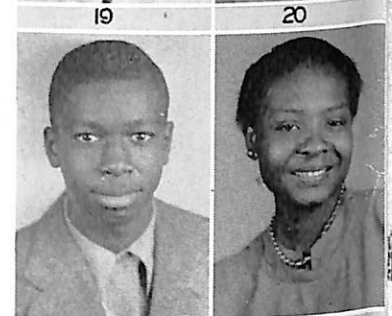
The Independent Party swamped the school to win the election. Then came our first senior meeting when we elected our officers.

Monrovia, Liberia
March 5, 1948

Dear Mr. Cornell:

I am enjoying my life in Liberia, a place of many interesting things.

While traveling in route to Liberia I stopped in Paris and found it very exciting. During my stay of three and a half days there, I had the pleasure of strolling various streets of Paris and one night I went on an excursion of Paris by night. This was simply wonderful. You should have been along. I visited three night clubs and a beautiful vaudeville show. I also went to the top of the Arc de Triumph and looked down on the city and I noticed that all of the streets led to a V shaped design and the trees planted along the streets which makes beautiful scene. I thought the city was well planned but it shows definite signs of great destruction during the war.

I am attending the College of West Africa, which is not a college but a high school. The school seems to be well organized. The children are friendly and quite progressive in their thinking. Many of the children leave here and go to the States for college training and do well in their grades. We heard from a girl last week who is an A student. The school has a number of extra-curricular activities and I was selected as assistant coach of athletics. I hope to develop a pretty good

basket ball team this year. I am chairman of the publicity committee of my class. I am also an officer in the dramatic club. I am keeping up with my music in trombone but we do not have a band at the school. I practice at home daily. As you know this is my greatest interest.

The school year here is different from in the States. We begin school in February and go until October. October is the beginning of the dry season and it is hotter here during October, December, January, March, April and May. The rains begin in April and are worse during June, July and August. We have our mid-year vacation in July.

I think I have made a pretty good adjustment. I have made a number of friends among boys and girls. There are some very likeable chaps here. Some of these friendships I shall always remember. I have not heard from a single friend whom I left behind in Atlanta. You can tell them that I would enjoy a letter once in a while.

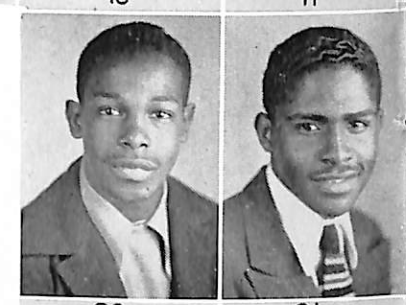
I shall also like to hear from you and some of my teachers.
