THE DEPROSPERO Class History

September, 1931:

Anxious children patiently waiting before the massive structure of Booker T. Washington High School, scanned the building from end to end while their minds pondered what might prevail behind these towering walls. This group seemed to realize as it waited so patiently for someone to claim them, that a very delicate step in education was about to be taken and it was up to them to make the best of it . . . When the classifications were read, many dear friends and classmates were separated. This group, though divided, could not be thwarted. As they filed into their respective classes, they didn't feel lonely. New friends were made and nobody was a stranger. Teacher and student met with courtesy, each respecting the rights of the other.

We will admit joyfully, that we were quite a bit wild, but this is characteristic of all new students in the junior class. Everybody became accustomed to the ways of the school and soon felt proud of being a part of such a progressive institution.

Each year as we received our promotion cards, we felt as though another mile stone had been passed in our striving to do a better grade of work. The years rolled by with routine events filling our schedule adequately.

1933-34:---

An epoch-making year this was in our rapidly growing lives. This year marked the inauguration of junior honor trips. The first junior honor trip included about thirty of us.

The success of the trip served as an ideal for the average students to such an extent that many of us were eligible for the trip to Chattanooga Tennessee, the next year. Many of us saw and were thrilled by our first sight of Lookout Mountain. Possibly the greatest and climaxing event of these junior years was graduation to the senior high school. Fruits of their labors were gathered by Nina Bailey and Emma Martin, who received highest and second highest honors, respectively. The class boasted a long list of honor students.

1934-'35-'35:---

These years were a preparatory period for our senior year in Washington High. Work was not difficult and much time was spent in extra-curricular activity. In the eleventh grade many of us held important positions in the student government. This was an introductory period to our mulitude of senior activities.

1934-'35:---

The senior year has been the most interesting year of our high school career. Everyone has enjoyed the distinction of being a senior. The class has enjoyed the privilege of exercising the controlling voice in the student government. The class of '37 has given an administration that will go down in the history of the school as good, efficient government.

Another activity in which the class has taken a major interest and contributed to the success of is the Glee Club. The singing of Marguerite Weldon, Olivia Little, Mable Marigno, Dorothy Dixon, Lucile Ealey, Albert Pettis, Grady Sims and Leotis Hood has added to the sweetness of mixed group songs . . . Dorothy Chaffin, Vivian Hunt, Fleming Williams, Ruth Smith and Isolyn Comer are promising prospects for future orators.

When the greatest event in our lives has been witnessed, we will feel that a great part of the task of education is over. Although we may leave Washington, our loyalty, love and the spirit she imbedded in our hearts will live forever wherever our "dream boats" take us . . . We are not on the outside looking in; we are on the inside looking out . . . wondering what is the best way to present to the future the best that we have. —Emma Lynne Martin.







Many educational opportunities come to the students of small private institutions that publicly supported ones don't have a chance to vie for. In recent years, students in the upper levels of their classes have had a chance to compete for scholarships to the best centers of learning in America, but usually they were small private institutions. Five years ago, the University of Chicago started giving competitive examinations for the entrance of southern students into college work. Booker Washington High School was not included in this list of eligibles Like a "still small voice crying in the wilderness," a faculty member, whose extensive preparation for her life's work took her from Atlanta to Columbia University, tried to gain entrance for Washington High in these contests. A personal triumph for her was the introduction of a course in Negro Literature into the Atlanta public school curriculum. When the "small voice" rose to this crescendo, Mr. E. C. Miller, registrar of ChicagoUniversity, heard and invited us to participate in the examinations. We owe this distinct honor toMrs. L. D. Shivery, head of the Washington High School English department.

On April 17, 1937, thirty-three senior high school students took examinations in English, Mathematics, Languages and Sciences. Those students in the order of their eligibility, were Albert Pettis, Nina Bailey, Jeanette Berry, Catherine Brown, Johnnie Mae Hines, Vivian Hunt, Emma Martin, Evelyn Seace, Walter Banks, Paralee Clarke, Isolyn Comer, Pearlie Craft, Louise Hines, Olivia Little, Roselle Wimbish, Evelyn Wright, Frances Latten, Elizabeth Patton, Emory Little, Frances Maddox, Ruth Smith, Gertrude Dodson, Frederick Leigh, Thomas S. Putman, Blanche Smith, Roswell Sutton, Lillie Mae Thornton, Marguerite Weldon, Alberta Wilson, Bessie Appleby, Sterling Gill, Mable Lee, and Ruth Miner. They presented themselves eagerly and hopefully that they may make a creditable showing.

Washington High "broke through" an educational barrier and proved herself worthy. The "still small voice" still calls for academic freedom and equality of opportunity.
