




Enrollment by Race/Ethnicity: APS and Cluster












EOG Milestones Results: Benteen & Burgess 2018 Percentage Proficient and Above









EOG Milestones Results: Dunbar & BAMO 2018 Percentage Proficient and Above






EOG Milestones Results: Parkside & F.A. Toomer 2018 Percentage Proficient and Above






EOG Milestones Results: King MS 2018 Percentage Proficient and Above





APS Cohort Graduation Rates by School



Equity and Excellence at APS Community Engagement

Purpose / Call to Action

The Atlanta Board of Education is committed to providing each student at every school with the full support and opportunity to fulfill their highest potential. The Board acknowledges the historic and current inequity, bias, and oppression existing at all levels of our society, including our schools. In Atlanta, we have experienced unique challenges which have divided neighborhoods, broken trust, and called integrity into question. We seek to understand, disrupt, and dismantle patterns and structures of institutional bias (conscious or unconscious) creating disparities and perpetuating achievement gaps among students.

Atlanta's, and Atlanta Public Schools', history demands that the primary focus of our equity policy must be race. In APS, data shows our greatest opportunity gaps exist among our African-American and Hispanic students across all neighborhoods, and further that race is closely correlated with income. However, the Board recognizes other forms of inequality and oppression which intersect with race and with one another, including but not limited to: ethnicity, national origin, and cultural/language heritage; gender; sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression; religion; family structure; housing situation; interaction with the justice system; physical, intellectual, or emotional disability; learning differences. These factors reach beyond our traditional narrative of the north-south divide to expose disparities within neighborhoods, schools, and classrooms.

Equity requires strategic decision-making to remedy opportunity and learning gaps and create a barrier-free environment, which enables all students to graduate ready for college and career. While APS has made some progress in addressing the past, we must be bold and intentional if we are to design systems to truly affirm all the gifts and needs that make each of our students unique individuals.

The School Board recognizes that a number of critical factors must be considered to ensure that all students achieve at high levels. Some of these factors include, but are not limited to: (1) academic program, (2) talent management, (3) systems and resources, and (4) culture.

Equity and Excellence at APS Community Engagement

GOALS

In order to achieve equity for each and every student, the district will:

- Conduct a needs assessment for every school
- Provide every student with equitable access to high quality vertically aligned curriculum, support, facilities and other educational resources, even when this means differentiating resource allocation.
- Prioritize and ensure adequate funding for disenfranchised schools and students, which will require reevaluation of budget to find
 resources for this investment.
- Develop partnerships and resources with other municipalities, businesses and stakeholders in communities surrounding individual schools. These partnerships will align with Equity Plan of APS providing exposure to nontraditional educational opportunities.
- Develop strategies and initiatives directed to increase participation of African American and Latino students and parents in school programming, classroom and parent organizations.
- Develop innovative and communication approaches and strategies that authentically reach each community.
- Address the results of systemic oppression such as, toxic stress, historical injustice, multigenerational poverty and racial disparity
- Teacher Quality

Key Areas

- o **Communication:** The office of Communication will work with each Cluster to create a robust Cluster and School based communication plan that is suitable to maximize the communication efforts of said cluster and school.
- o **Budget:** The School Board commits to aggressively seek the funding necessary to guarantee equity in the allocation of resources to every school throughout the District and to support the Superintendent's implementation of the equity plan.
- o **Behaviors:** The District shall remedy the practices, including assessment, that lead to the over-representation of students of color in areas such as special education and discipline, and the under-representation in programs such as talented and gifted and Advanced Placement. The District will also develop a robust plan of action to ensure that students assigned to its Alternative Schools will continue to meet or exceed expectations.

Equity and Excellence at APS Community Engagement

Structures/Process for Implementation and Accountability

- The Board, either collectively or through the actions of individual Board members, shall not modify this Equity policy more than once a year.
- All new Board members will engage in equity professional development.
- The board will develop annual equity outcome goals, as aligned with the school system mission and its definition of equity.
- The Superintendent is authorized to develop procedures to implement this policy, including a (1) clear timeline plan with elements such as identification of gaps in educational experiences and outcomes, (2) identification of potential root causes, (3) an implementation plan for programs, practices and systems that addresses these disparities, (4) an evaluation rubric and accountability standards for measuring success, through an Equity Balanced Score Card, (5) training plans and (6) an ongoing plan for continuous improvement.
- The district shall review existing policies, programs, professional development and procedures to ensure the promotion of equity.
- The School Board will establish a Community Equity Advisory Committee to provide advice and input to the Superintendent on the Equity plan and to advise the Superintendent on equity issues within the school district. The Equity Task Force is an advisory committee of the School Board and shall include the Superintendent as well as at least _____ other members appointed by the School Board. The initial term should be for _____.
- Bi-Annual Equity Report the Superintendent shall develop an Equity Plan or plan update. Bi-Annually, the School Board in conjunction with the beginning of the budget process will review the Superintendent's report and Equity Plan to ensure that all students are being provided equitable access to excellent educational opportunities.
