Subject: Getting in Good Trouble, Partner Appreciation, Educators in Motion, and More

Thank you for your continued support of Atlanta Public Schools (APS) and our efforts to ensure every student receives a high-quality education. As we focus on virtual learning through January 2021, we will continue to provide monthly health data checkpoints. The next update will be at the November 2 Atlanta Board of Education meeting, which you can watch live or on-demand on the Board's Facebook page.

During this virtual learning period, we are exploring ways to support our most vulnerable learners, particularly our low-incidence special needs population and our youngest students, including their potential return to some in-person services before January 2021. We will provide you with an update on these efforts soon.

APS Good Trouble Voter Campaign Registers 576 New Students

It's election season, and we're getting in good trouble! The APS Good Trouble Voter Campaign, a partnership between APS and <u>When We All Vote</u>, is educating and inspiring APS students and families about the importance of voting while honoring the late Congressman and civil rights leader John Lewis, who once said, "Never, ever be afraid to make some noise and get in good trouble, necessary trouble."

We launched the campaign on September 22, National Voter Registration Day. Our APS student ambassadors, led by the Office of Social Studies, facilitated a voter registration drive through October 5, garnering 576 newly registered APS student voters in less than two weeks. North Atlanta High School registered the most eligible student voters (74), followed by Booker T. Washington High School (65), and South Atlanta High School (52). Carver Early College registered the highest percentage of eligible student voters (84%), followed by Coretta Scott King Young Women's Leadership Academy (64%).

The Campaign will continue through Election Day on November 3. Early voting runs October 12-30 in Georgia. Let's get in good trouble and get out the vote! <u>Read more here</u>.

Innovation Grant Fund

RedefinED Atlanta has launched the Innovation Fund to assist APS and our community with addressing critical needs and creating more equitable learning environments during the pandemic. APS leaders, educators, and staff as well as organizations that work with and support public schools in the District, can apply for one of four levels of grants: \$2,500 and less, \$2,501 - \$5,000, \$5,001 - \$10,000, and \$10,001 - \$15,000. Those grant dollars can be used for programs that support enrichments like virtual clubs and the arts, extra academic instruction for children in under-resourced communities, student, parent, or community communications, the development of mobile wifi units, and more.
