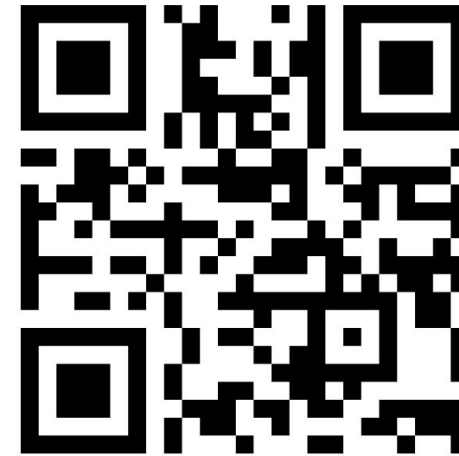

Theory of Action for T.H.E.O.

- **If** Atlanta's faith-based and educational leaders hold meaningful and deliberate convenings, so that we can better understand the assets, as well as the challenges that face our most vulnerable youth, **and**
- **If** we commit to targeted goal setting, collective advocacy and sharing of resources, knowledge and social capital,
- **So that** we can enable sustainable partnerships and support intentional program planning and implementation at the at the school level,
- **Then** our equity goals and outcomes will be achieved, and our students and families will be empowered through greater hope and opportunities.

Guiding Questions for T.H.E.O.

1. What role is there for faith communities to become **more engaged partners** in the work of improving student outcomes?
2. What can **strong alliances** between faith leaders, schools, communities, and advocates look like?
3. What **impact** might these partnerships have?
4. How do we **measure** our impact?

Key Levers for Change

- **Direct Partnership:** Support opportunities for schools, and the school district to partner more strategically with faith-based organizations in order to advance outcomes for the children who are shared between these organizations.
- **Social Capital Exchange:** Commit to providing opportunities for each of the sectors to learn from each other.

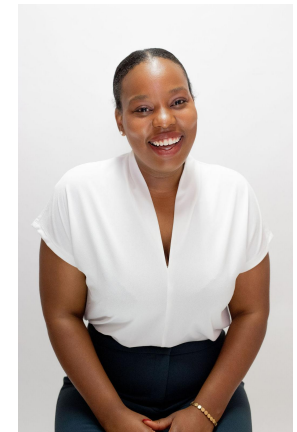

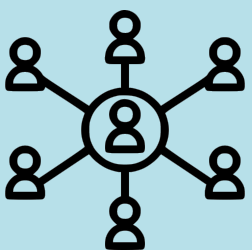

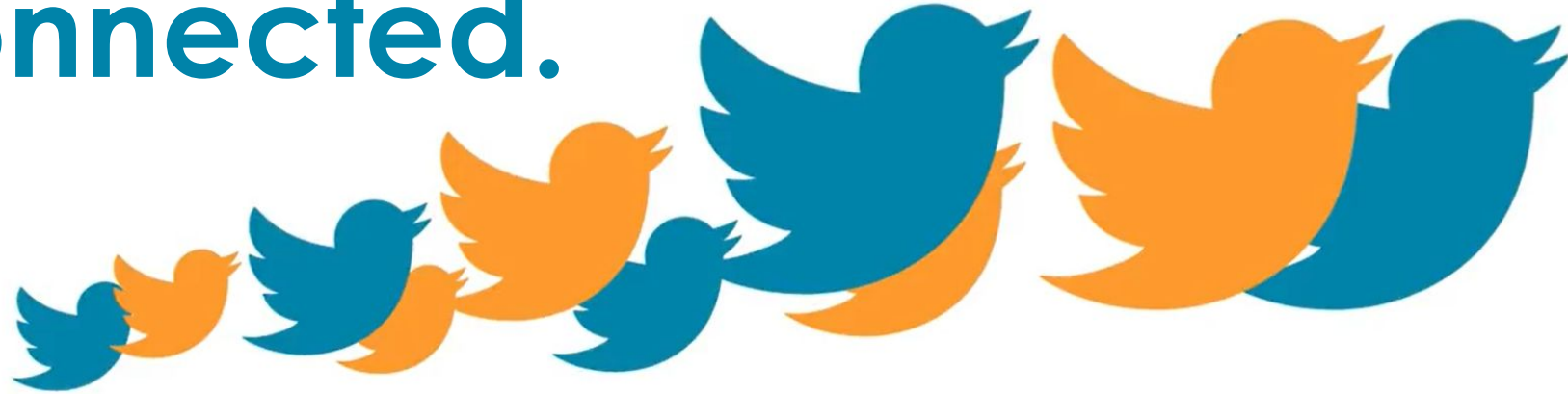

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APS Student Attendance Goals

98%

Every Atlanta Public School will have a take rate of **98%** or more.

85%

The Percentage of Students district-wide who are not chronically absent will increase to **85%** by the end of the 21-22 SY.

94%

The Atlanta Public Schools average daily attendance (ADA) rate will be **94%** for the 21-22 SY.

Why School Attendance Matters...

Students who regularly attend school and graduate from high school build a foundation for more positive life outcomes:



Better academic performance



Increased graduation rate



More work options and earning potential



Greater opportunities for higher education



Higher civic engagement



More developed life skills that positively influence health and economic decisions

What Does It Take to Get a Child to School Every Day?

1. Family Practices

Families nurture a habit of attendance at home

2. Social Capital

Helpers who are relatives, friends, neighbors

3. Schools

Teachers, nurses, counselors, administrators, etc.

4. Community Services

Availability of services like transportation, health services, affordable stable housing, etc.

Georgia Legislative Overview



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2022 Legislative Vote Summary

- [House Bill 888](#), popularly known as the “Critical Race Theory” Bill (✗ Did not pass.)
- [Senate Bill 377](#), which held similar concepts as House Bill 888 (✗ Did not pass.)
- [Senate Bill 613](#), compared to Florida’s “Don’t Say Gay” Bill (✗ Did not pass.)
- [House Bill 1084](#) “Protect Students First Act” (✓ Did pass.)
- [Senate Bill 435](#) “Save Girls Sports Act” (✓ Did pass.)
- [House Bill 1178](#) “Parents’ Bill of Rights” (✓ Did pass.)

2022 Legislative Review for Bills that Did Not Pass

- **House Bill 888**, which became popularly known as the “**Critical Race Theory**” bill, died in committee and will not move forward to the Senate. (✗ Did not pass.)
- **Senate Bill 377**, which held similar concepts as **HB 888** and intended to limit the rights of school boards and districts to teach concepts regarding race also died in committee. (✗ Did not pass.)
- **Senate Bill 613**, which was formerly compared to Florida’s “Don’t Say Gay” bill, would have barred schools from discussion gender identity or sexual orientation in primary school. **This bill has also failed to advance.** (✗ Did not pass.)
- **The APS Board of Education** took an early stance against these bills, issuing an official memorandum highlighting the importance of teaching diverse perspectives in Atlanta Public Schools.



What do the Implications of the Proposed Legislation Mean for APS Students?

Senate Bill 1178- “Parents Bill of Rights”

- Increases parental access to student records and heightens the responsibility of school districts to provide parents with access to curriculum and instructional information
- Potential threat to school district autonomy by heightening opportunities for undue scrutiny by parents to question curriculum and instructional decisions
- Creates avenues for challenges to school districts by parents which can potentially limit educational expertise and authority of education leaders

What do the Implications of the Proposed Legislation Mean for APS Students?

Senate Bill 1084

- This bill is an extension of House Bill 888.
- Threatens teaching of concepts related to topics considered “divisive”
- Limits school district and teacher autonomy in development and delivery of curriculum
- Potential penalties for districts found in “violation” of the legislation. Schools may lose access to special waivers provided by the State Board of Education.

Senate Bill 435- “Save Girls Sports Act”

- Perpetuates inequities against transgender students by prohibiting their participation in athletics
- Violation of Title IX and federal protections for students against discrimination based on gender
- Conflicts with APS Board Policy JAA which of Board Policy JAA, Equal Educational Opportunities which states, “students are entitled to equal educational opportunities regardless of their race, color...gender identity or expression.”



What's at stake for our children? Why is this important?

- Become critical thinkers who can empathize with people who are different from themselves.
- Constructively engage with difference, think objectively, and challenge personal biases as they navigate their place in the world.
- Compete in the global society as individuals who are knowledgeable about the experiences and cultures of others.
- Acknowledge & discuss the complexities of our inherited history and its systems, which at times does not reflect the ideals of our democracy.
- Actively respond to and engage with racism and other issues that challenge our democracy.

- APS should explore regular cluster or neighborhood meetings to discuss chronically absent students.
- Need to understand the capacity of parents to help students get to school.
- Create greater supports for students experiencing homelessness to get to school.
- Schools need to be a safe space for parents as well. Parents could be intimidated by the expectation to support a student's education if they may not have had the opportunity to receive a solid educational background themselves.
- Meeting parents where they are at could get them involved and support them helping get their students to school.

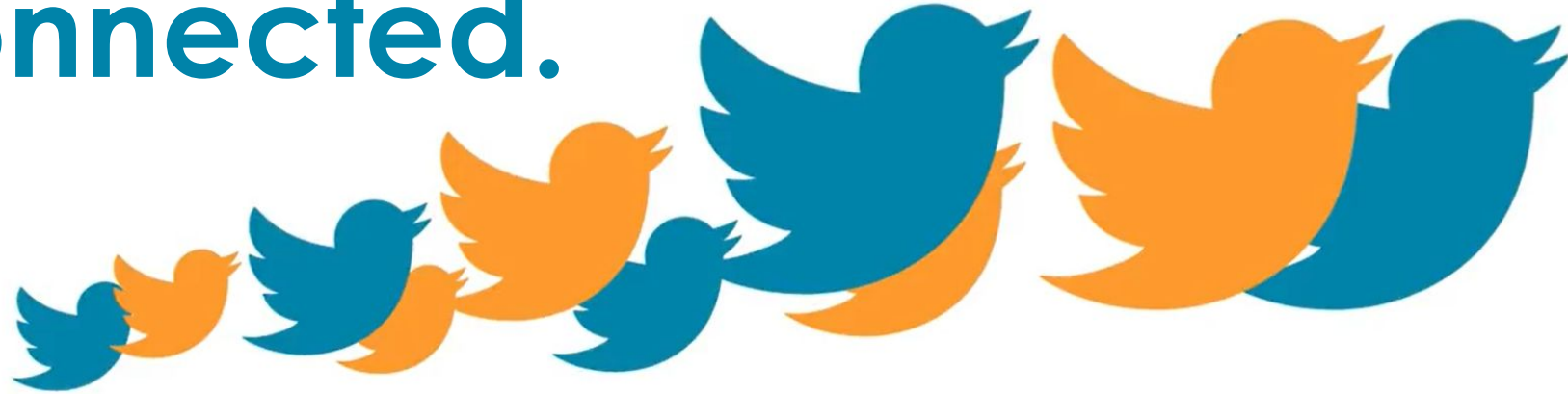
