

Goals of the HB 888: Education; treatment of race and other individual traits and beliefs; add new statues and amend various existing statue

- To add new statutes and amend various existing statutes to include provisions regarding the treatment of race and other individual traits and beliefs in public education in this state
- To prohibit state agencies, local boards of education, or public elementary or secondary school administrators, teachers, or other personnel from compelling any individual to affirm, adopt, adhere to, profess, or promote concepts in violation of certain federal and state anti-discrimination laws
- To prohibit the inclusion of certain concepts in courses offered in public elementary and secondary schools of this state

- To provide for the promotion and protection of the intellectual freedom of students, faculty, and other personnel at public postsecondary educational institutions in this state
- To provide for a complaint resolution policy and process; to provide for legislative findings and intent; to provide for definitions; to provide for penalties; to provide for remedies; to provide for statutory construction; to provide for conforming changes; to provide for related matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes

Rationale for House Bill 888

- No provision in the United States Constitution or the Georgia Constitution enables either the United States government or the government of this state to compel persons to affirm, adopt, adhere to, profess, or promote specific beliefs.
- Slavery and the ideology that slavery has longstanding impact are false. There is history that wars were fought and policies created to "level the playing fields for African Americans", so as to eliminate the need of connecting hardships of modern day minorities to historical oppression.
- The State Board of Education, GaDOE and State Charter Schools Commission have policies that align with Title IV and Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the 48 federal Education Amendments of 1972, Code Section 20-2-131, and Code 49 Section 20-2-315;
 - These effectively hold the state responsible for upholding racial equality for students. (Therefore, we don't need to talk about inequities, there are already measures in place to ensure it doesn't happen.)

What's at stake...

Impact of Proposed Prohibitions:

- Contracts for speakers, consultants, and trainers
- Professional development opportunities for teachers
- Content, curriculum, and instructional programs
- Ability for opportunities for instructors to engage in discussions of public policy

Proposed Shifts To School Operational Procedures:


- Beginning 2022 school year, schools must maintain a detailed list of primary instruction materials on their websites
- Materials must be reviewed twice annually to ensure compliance with provisions in the bill
- Schools must make all materials proposed for use available for review by parent or emancipated minors enrolled in courses



Implications of HB 888

Proposed Penalties:

- Reductions is state education funding (20%) for violating districts
- Public condemnation for violations
- Limitations on district level autonomy in education decision making, which is a contradiction to Georgia's tradition of local control
- Impact on teacher's ability to teach diverse perspectives in history, social studies, civics, etc.





Federal law requires, and we have civic responsibility as educators to:

- 1. Create **engaged citizens** who uphold our democratic and pluralistic ideals.
- 2. Acknowledge and discuss the historical (and current) beauty and blind spots of our democracy.
- 3. Help our students constructively engage with difference, think objectively, and challenge personal biases as they navigate their place in the world.
- 4. Provide opportunities for students to **engage in**, **and practice**, **civil discourse** by interacting with peers who hold opposing views.



The world our children will inherit is diverse and globally connected. By fulfilling the four responsibilities above, we enable our students to:

- 1. Become **critical thinkers** who can empathize with people who are different from themselves.
- 2. Compete in the **global society** as individuals who are knowledgeable about the experiences and cultures of others.
- 3. Actively respond to and engage with racism and other issues that challenge our democracy.
- 4. Practice, **civil discourse** by interacting with peers and others who hold opposing views.
