Do you have kids begging to help you in the kitchen? Kids love to help cook, but we may be hesitant because it might slow us down or make a mess. Although this may happen, the priceless memories with math will make it worthwhile. Below you will find four ways that your child may help in the kitchen using math.

- 1. Pull out the measuring cups. Allow your child to help with the measurement using measuring cups and spoons. This is a great introduction to FRACTIONS!
- 2. Practice using a thermometer. Understanding how to use meat thermometer helps everyone to enjoy safe food.
- 3. Allow kids to read the recipe card measurements. This way they are practicing reading measurements and comprehending them in the real
- 4. Use a cooking timer. We all know how important time is when baking a cake or a meatloaf. Show kids how to set the timer on their technology devices so their recipe doesn't burn.

As always, keep counting and go outside and play.

Let children see you read.



Children imitate what they see us giving time to in our own lives. By reading in front of growing readers, our actions really will speak louder than our admonishments. Seeing the adults they love to engage in reading acts as an invitation to children. Invite your children or students into living a literate life by sharing your reading habits openly. ~Laura Benson

- Phonics: Students will blend, segment, and read short vowel words. A lot of work will be focused on the medial vowel sound.
 - Literary: Students will learn about characters feelings and how they react to events.
 - Informational: Students will identify reasons an author gives to support points. Writing instruction will be connected to the daily reading
- 1 Phonics: Students will blend, segment, read, and spell words with 4 or 5 sounds, including suffix -s.
 - Literary: Students will compare the events of characters in folktales. They will also learn about the rising
 - action in a story.

 Writing: Students will begin crafting opinion writing pieces.
- Phonics: Student will learn to read words with the letter y as a vowel. Literary: Students will describe the overall structure of a drama (BME) and gain information from illustrations to understand characters
 - Informational: Students will describe the connection of between historical events in a
 - Writing: After completing the poetry unit, students will begin crafting opinion writing pieces.

- Literary: Students will read and learn about the different characteristics of fairy tales and folktales.
 - Informational: Students will learn how authors organize nonfiction texts and determine what information can be gained from labels, captions,
- infographics, etc. **Phonics:** Students are reading and spelling open and closed syllable words that contain prefixes and suffixes
- Literary: Students will explain the major structural differences between dramas, poems, and prose (stories) when writing about the text

Informational: Students will compare first and secondhand

- accounts of the same topic. **Writing:** Students will complete their informational writing pieces.
- Literary: Students will learn how a series of scenes fit together to provide the overall structure of a drama.
 - Informational: Students will learn to synthesize information from multiple sources to arrive at a deeper understanding of a topic. They will also analyze how visual elements contribute to the meaning and tone of a
 - Writing: Students will practice writing in each genre (narrative, opinion, and information)
