296 Being able to consolidation funds has provided greater flexibility for our schools. This gives our schools more flexibility
 297 concerning how it uses available resources to meet identified needs of students. In addition to pushing more dollars to
 298 schools and giving principals increased flexibility and autonomy, the district rolled out the Student Success Funding (SSF)
 299 model. Under SSF schools receive funding levels suited to student needs and have more input on how to design their
 300 budgets around their goals. The goal of SSF is to equitably and transparently allocate funds to schools; align funding in order
 301 to achieve district strategic goals; and to empower schools with increased flexibility in their budgetary and operational
 302 decisions. Schools have used the seat time waiver to create intervention blocks; the school day waiver to increase the
 303 number of hours students are at school; and the teacher certification waiver to recruit non-traditionally certified employees
 304 with subject matter experience, career knowledge, and technical expertise.
