

2011-2012 CHARTER SCHOOL ANNUAL REPORT

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INTRODUCTION.

Charter schools are not a panacea, they are one of many different strategic approaches that the district uses to create quality choices for families in our district.

he past year has brought a number of significant changes to the district and charter schools were no exception. Two new charter schools have opened, two charter schools have closed, and funding continues to shrink just as enrollment continues to grow. One of the district's oldest and largest charter schools has received board approval for expansion and one of APS's newer charter schools has moved into a new home after committing to a strong partnership with their new neighbors.

In addition to these school-level changes, there have been significant changes to the administration of the APS charter program. First, the district was one of four recipients of the Performance Management, Replication and Closure (PMRC) grant. Under this grant, APS has developed a new performance framework for district charter schools. This framework, which has been developed through discussions with the best charter authorizers across the country, sets clearly articulated academic, financial and operational performance goals for charter schools and allows all stakeholders to readily access key information about the performance of APS charter schools. Using the framework, schools will be able to determine early and with greater confidence whether or not they are reaching the goals set in their charters.

One other significant change, the APS Office of Charter Schools is now the Office of Innovation. This change in name signals a shift from a focus solely on charters to a broader focus on best practice identification and dissemination across the district. This work has already begun and partnerships are in place allowing best practices to spread from individual high-performing schools to lower-performing schools where these best practices will touch the lives of increasing numbers of students. This focus on collaboration between charter schools and traditional schools benefits administrative and instructional staff, parents, and, most importantly, children. Charter schools are not a panacea, they are one of many different strategic approaches that the district uses to create quality choices for families in our district. Although our name has changed, our focus remains on creating quality education options for the children and families we all serve.

ABOUT THIS REPORT.

The 2012 Charter School Annual Report is designed to give the reader a snapshot of each school's academic performance and profile. The report provides more data, than in previous years, and displays that data in a new format. Readers are encouraged to look closely at all of the data provided for each school and analyze them holistically, in order to gain a clear picture of the school's academic performance. We caution against making general assumptions based upon one or two elements found in a school's data.

o support the reader's understanding, an overview of the types of tables and charts presented in the report can be found, below:

Performance Tables – provide the reader with school performance on state-mandated Criterion Referenced Competency Tests (CRCT) and End of Course Tests (EOCT), between the 2009 and 2012 school years. The tables are organized by grade and subject for the CRCT and by subject and test administration for the EOCT. These tables display achievement data, by the percentage of students meeting standards on the given assessment.

Gap Tables – are provided as identifiers of highest performing subgroup(s) within the school and subgroup performance that may be potential areas of concern. The more the reader knows about the school's curriculum, instructional strategies and supports, teacher and leader quality and climate and culture, the better her/his understanding of a particular gap's significance will be. These tables present both the percentage of students meeting

standards and the percentage of students exceeding standards.

- Race/Ethnicity gap tables identify the highest performance for each subject test, in green text.
- Free & Reduced Priced Lunch and Students with Disabilities gap tables identify subject tests where performance shows no historical gap in green text.
- On each table where gaps are identified, those gaps between 10 percentage points and 19.9 percentage points give rise to moderate concern. They are identified by grey text.

 Gaps which are 20 percentage points or larger are flagged for immediate attention.

 They are identified by red text.

Demographic Comparisons – We report demographic group sizes if they are larger than 10 because it is the standard practice of federal and state accountability. However, when making comparisons to or between groups of very small size, conclusions should be drawn with caution.

While tiny changes (as little as one student) can cause enormous shifts in percentage results for small groups, for large groups to evidence the same percentage change would take greater effort.

For example, with a group size of 10, only 7 students are needed to exceed standards for a result of 70% Exceeds. However, for a group size of 100, it would take 70 students to reach the same 70% Exceeds marker. The example below illustrates the point:

Here, Group B's Exceeds performance is 20 percentage points higher than Group A's (40% minus 20%). However, when considering the relative size of the groups (250 students versus 10), it is clear that much more than the presented data would be needed before a conclusion regarding these results could be made. For example, the 4 students in Group B may have shared the same tutor, provided by their parents, outside of the school day. ABC School might then consider how to extend support to Group A students based upon identified needs and budget constraints. The gap is flagged in red denoting the need for a much closer look at the instructional program and its performance results to determine if changes need to be made.

n – The number of students tested may differ depending upon the subject. The differences are very small, usually between 1 and 4 students. For ease of reference and display, each demographic group displays the largest number of students across the subject assessments.

Charts - Where possible, those CRCT grades with promotional requirements have charted results in reading, math and science. Schools with fewer than 3 tested grades will have charts for their assessed 2012 grade levels.

Abbreviations - SWD (Students With Disabilities) FRL (Free and Reduced Lunch)

Atlanta Neighborhood Charter Schools

The Atlanta Neighborhood Charter School (ANCS) is a K-8 charter school with two campuses formed by the merger of two charter schools. These schools, Neighborhood Charter School (open 2001), serving kindergarten through fifth grade students and, Atlanta Charter Middle School (open 2005), serving sixth through eighth grade students, are located in the Grant Park/Ormewood Park communities of Atlanta.

The ANCS charter petition was formally approved by the Georgia State Board of Education in March 2011, after receiving approval from the Atlanta Board of Education. The current ANCS charter agreement runs from July 1, 2011 until June 30, 2016.

The school operates from a constructionist framework, placing students at the center of their learning, actively engaging them in hands-on exploration and moving them towards mastery of higher order concepts and skills.

Atlanta Neighborhood Charter Elementary (ANCS-E) performed above the district on 15 out of the 15 CRCT assessments administered in 2012. The school has evidenced consistently high performance on each of the CRCT subject assessments, from 2009 – 2012.

Gaps exist between the percentage of black students and the percentage of white and multi-racial students meeting or exceeding standards on all CRCT subject tests, in 2012. Gaps in exceeding standards also exist for students eligible for FRL and students with disabilities.

Atlanta Neighborhood Charter Middle (ANCS-M) performed above the district on 15 out of the 15 CRCT assessments administered in 2012. Grade 7 performance on mathematics and science CRCT assessments has shown noteworthy improvement, since 2009.

Demographic tables identify performance gaps for black students in math, science and social studies, when compared to the performance of white and multi-racial subgroups. In reading and ELA, performance gaps exist between these groups in the percentage of students that exceed standards. Performance gaps were also identified for students eligible for FRL and students with disabilities, in mathematics, science and social studies. Gaps exist in the total percentage of these student populations meeting, as well as exceeding, standards for these subjects.

















Atlanta Preparatory Academy

Atlanta Preparatory Academy (APA) is a school of choice open to all students residing in the Atlanta Public Schools district. APA's core curriculum is the Paragon Curriculum and the school offers a magnet-like Arts and Technology focus that links core learning with multiple learning styles. Core curriculum also includes top rated, phonics-based Open Court Reading, SRA Math, Harcourt Brace Science, and Spanish. Paragon is a proprietary social studies/history/geography program that incorporates literature, drama, art, music, and technology. Paragon engages students with hands-on exploration and reinforces core morning classes by addressing varying student learning styles. Atlanta Preparatory Academy works with parents, involving them in the education of their children and forming a partnership aimed at increasing each child's academic achievement.

Atlanta Preparatory Academy performed below the district on 21 of the 25 CRCT assessments administered in 2012. The school's performance is far lower than the district's on the mathematics, science and social studies CRCT assessments. Grades 6 and 7 students fared best in mathematics, where close to ¾ of them met standards. However, performance at grades 3 through 5 reflects approximately half of all students failed to meet standards.

Demographic gap analysis indicates that four out of 5 students with disabilities failed to meet standards on the mathematics or social studies assessments.














Charles R. Drew Charter School

Tech High School performed better than the district on 6 of the 8 EOCT subject assessments administered in 2012. The school also performed better than the State on 4 of the 2012 assessments. However, as can be seen from the performance table that follows, 73.9% of the students taking the Math II assessment did <u>not</u> meet standards, resulting in district and state performance gaps.

The school evidenced a consistent drop in cohort enrollment, since 2009. For example, 63 students entered as 9th graders in 2009, yet only 22 students were enrolled as seniors, in 2012. This reduction in enrollment resulted in a cohort loss rate of 65% over the 4 years.



Tech High EOCT (2009 - 2012)



In general, Wesley International has shown steady progress in performance on the CRCT assessments. On 28 of the 30 administered CRCT subject assessments in 2012, Wesley's performance was higher than the district. However, the school's Grade 5 performance has declined, over the past 4 years, in all subjects.

Demographic gap analyses identify performance gaps for black students in science and social studies. In addition, students receiving free or reduced price lunch are less likely to exceed on the CRCT assessments than their counterparts.
